Class Gift Fund

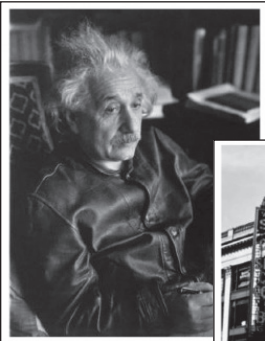
At our 50th Reunion the class of '62 presented the university with a check for the Cornell Annual Fund/50th Reunion Campaign of \$18,000,000—quite an impressive present.

But over these many years, we have contributed in another very special way: the Class Gift Fund.

Which is why your class council has voted to give \$10,000 to the Johnson Museum of Art to expand the Class of 1962 Photography Fund (currently 22 works by renowned lens-people like Edward Steichen, Lotte Jacobi, Andreas Feininger, and Bruce Davidson). Ours is the only class-supported photography collection at the museum.

And we have presented another \$5,000 check to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, continuing to support the Great Blue Heron nest cam project—live online streaming of nesting Great Blue Herons and the pond at Sapsucker Woods during nesting season. The cam also displays on a monitor in the Lab of Ornithology lobby.

Since graduation, our class has contributed more than \$100,000 to Cornell in areas of the environment, education, the arts, scholarship, and athletics.

Neil Schilke: Leading a Full and Rewarding Life

How do you describe Neil Schilke? Well, he's quiet, unassuming, laid back—and a very smart guy. How else could this longtime and respected member of the '62 class council have risen to become general director, engineering, corporate staffs of General Motors Corporation?

This is the same Neil Schilke who in high school dug ditches for the Cuyahoga County (Cleveland) road department—even washed the boss's car. The same Neil Schilke who worked as a "cinder man" in a Cleveland steel mill. And who ran a drill press at a GM Chevrolet plant drilling

holes in cast iron transmission casings. Indeed, though Neil came from modest employment beginnings, he knew quickly that he didn't want to do those jobs for the rest of his life, and that he needed to continue his education to the highest level.

Which is why Neil earned his bachelor and master's degrees in Mechanical Engineering at Cornell. He worked at GM all his professional life, especially at GM Research Laboratories.

During a 40-year career his abilities caused GM to choose Neil to lead a number of major engineering projects, including "probably the first production hybrid vehicle design in the industry" and creating a systems engineering capability for GM.

There's really no space for listing the number of awards and accolades Neil has received—we stopped counting at half a dozen. Nor the many technical and honor societies of which he's a member. The most prestigious is SAE, the Society of Automotive Engineers—an 80,000 member

organization for which he's served on the board of directors and, in 2001, as International President.

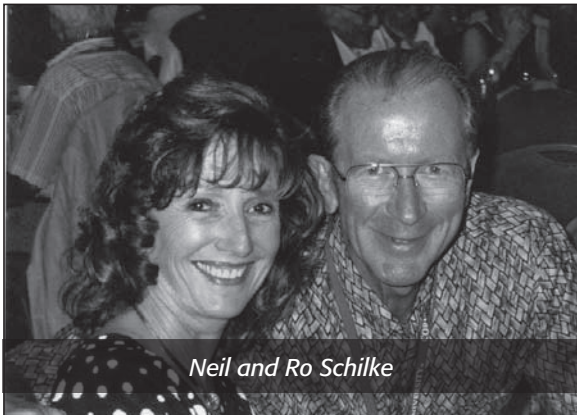

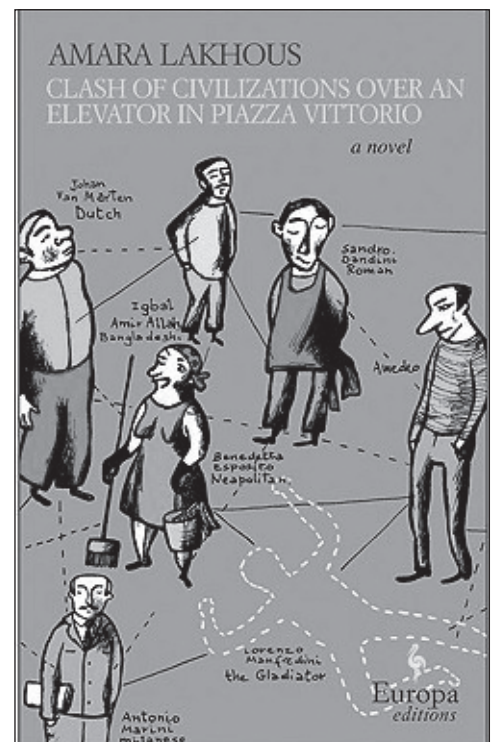

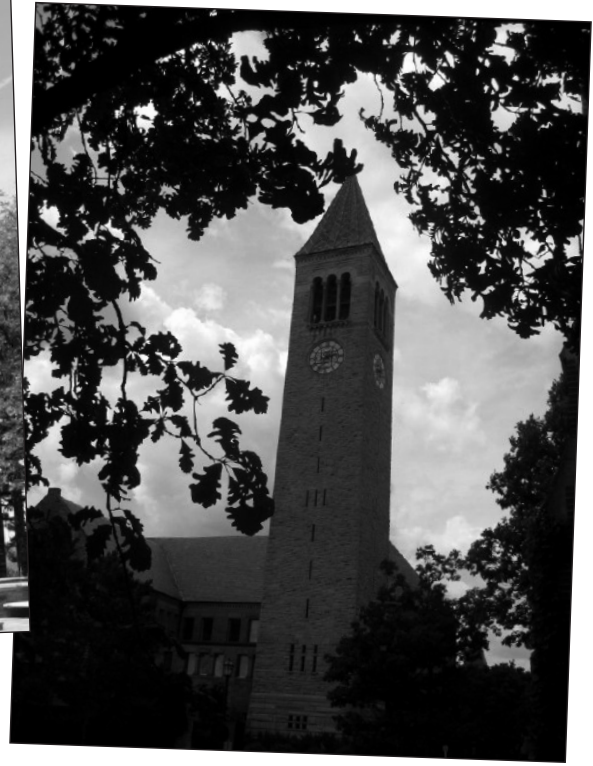
