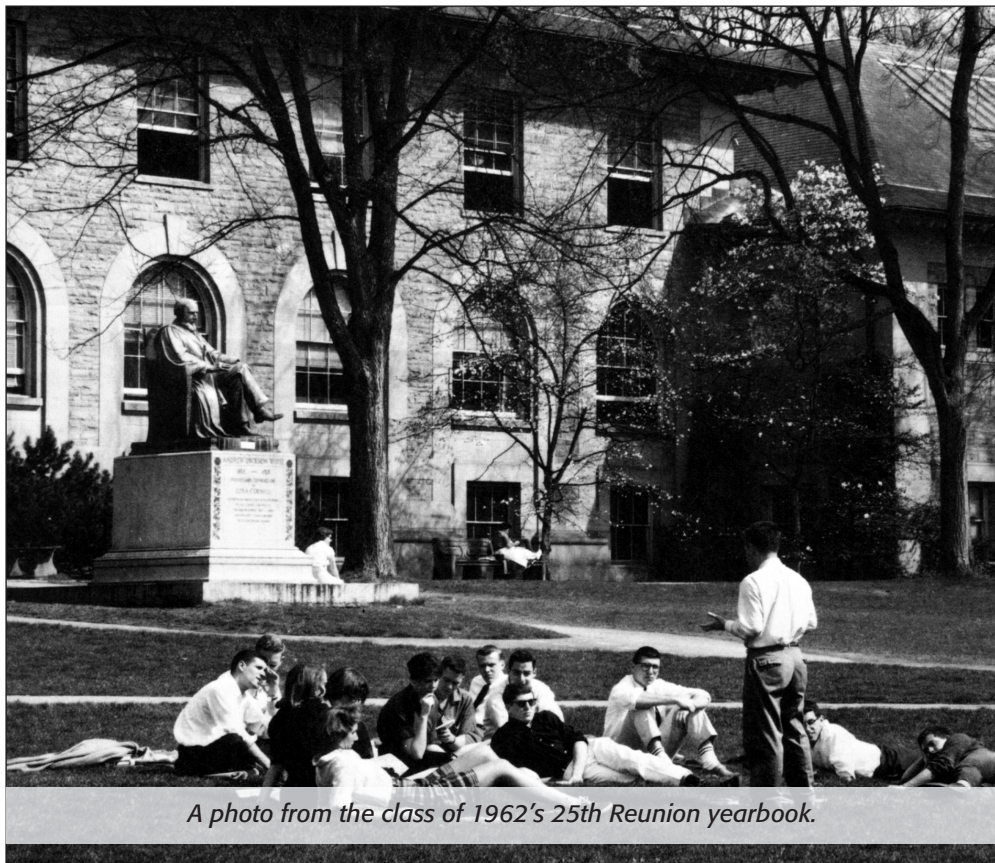


History in the Making—All About Us!

One Man's Journey From our 45th to our 50th

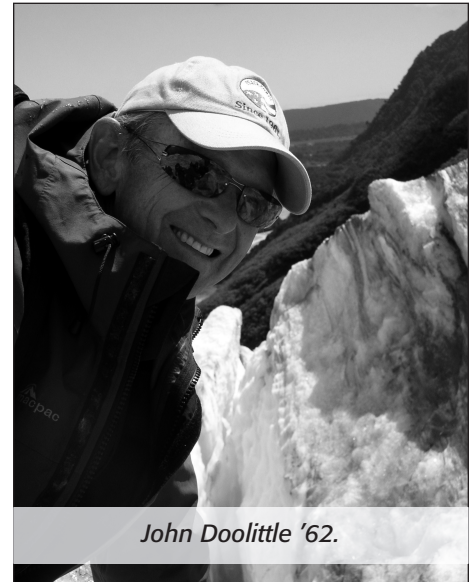
John Doolittle has accomplished a great deal since he left our 45th Reunion four years ago. As far as we know, he's the only member of our class to have joined the Peace Corps at the age of 67, after many years as a financial executive in the research area of California's Kaiser Permanente healthcare organization.

After his graduation in 1962, John did volunteer work in Laos, which led to a job with the U.S. State Department's Agency for International Development (USAID). He spent from 1962 through 1968 in Laos and Vietnam managing local cooperatives (in Laos) and various community development-related activities (in Vietnam).

That work gave him great satisfaction, so much so that, 45 years later, joining the Peace Corps would give him a chance to continue the work that had interested him many years before.

His Peace Corps assignment was in northeastern South Africa, in a small village just a few miles south of Kruger National Park. His job was to work with a local non-government organization (NGO) in promotion of "income-generating projects," such as a handicraft manufacturing and sales operation called "Wildly Africa." He assisted projects in mushroom production and beekeeping products marketed locally, but also in Afrikaner supermarkets. He had to teach the local people a course equivalent to "business 101" management training, which he considered his biggest accomplishment during that tour.

After his Peace Corps experience, John worked with a small, private U.S. and Thai-based organization involved in international development. This time, he found

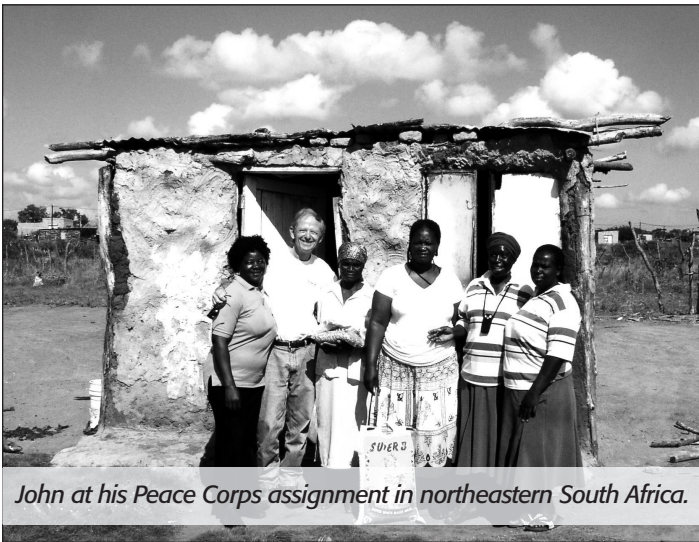


John Doolittle '62.

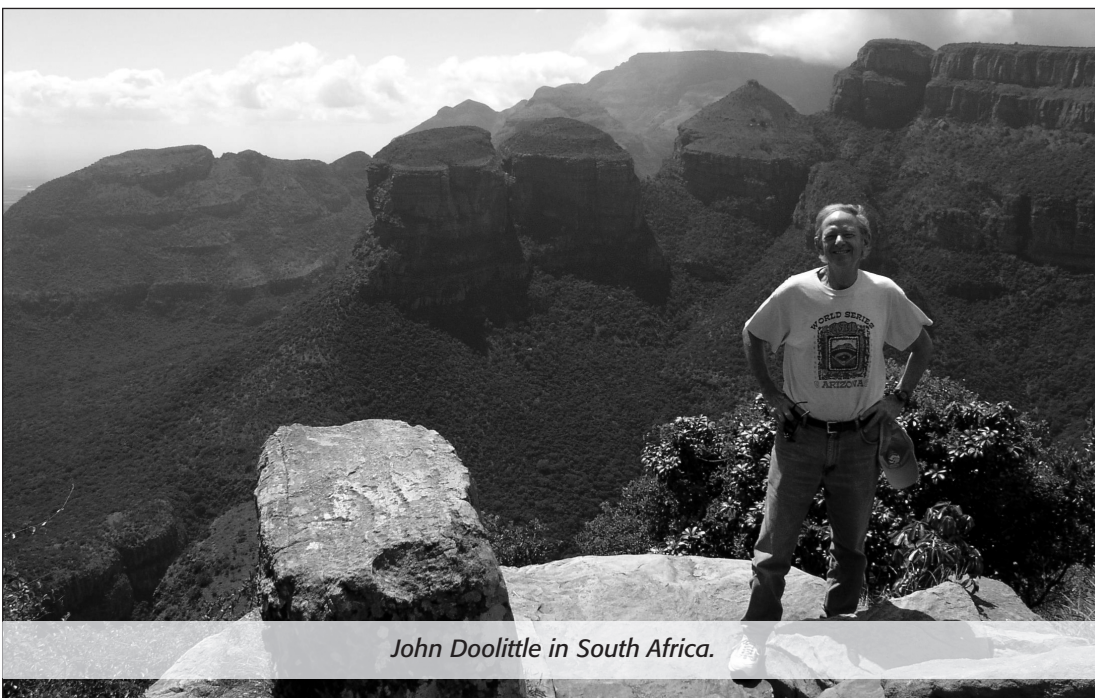
himself working in two small Thai villages—populated by minority Myanmar refugees—helping to plan and implement information-technology enhancements for local primary schools. However, his work for this private group eventually brought him back to the same area of South Africa where he'd worked before. This time, with little background in journalism, John resurrected a community newspaper—the *Nkomazi Voice*.

It was here that he came up close and personal with the real sadness and helplessness of the AIDS crisis in Africa, providing home-based care and burial services along the South Africa/Mozambique border. John said, "The stigma of this disease is so great, it's very hard to get people in rural areas to be tested. They'd just rather not know—scenes that would break your heart—death was ever present."

Funding ran out eventually—fallout from the economic downturn of the past couple of years—and John returned from Africa. He still does volunteer work, but now, as he approaches our 50th Reunion, John says, "Mostly I'm enjoying life in Northern California and Mazatlan, Mexico." However, in the four years since our 45th, for John Doolittle—what a life it has been!

Committee Seeks to Uphold Class Generosity

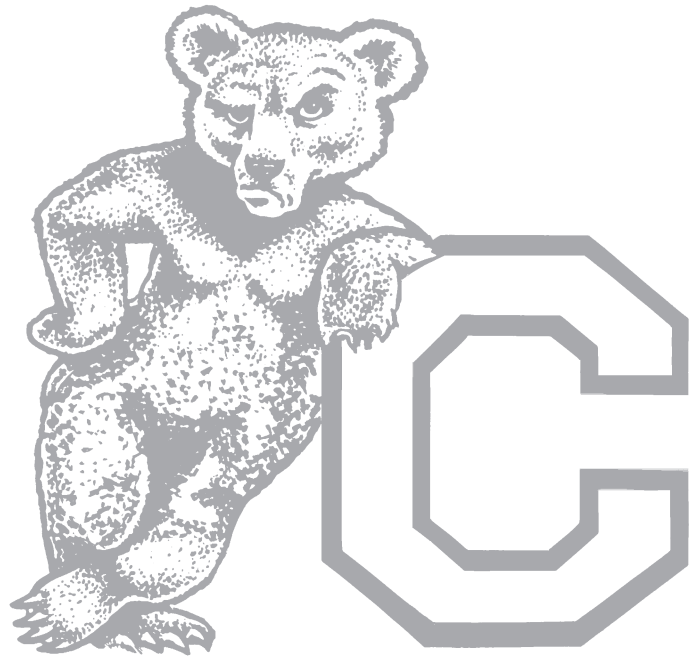
At our half-century mark, here's something you might seriously consider ...
